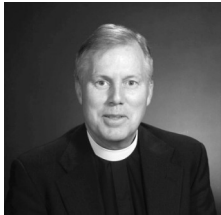

News from the Rector



Dear Friends,

"Take care of yourself!" This is one of the most common send-offs we give to those, we, ourselves, care about. I know, in my own interactions with others as a priest, a husband, a father, and friend, these are words I use often. And I use them because they are integral to my own spiritual journey, accessing the light and grace I am able to offer others.

Self-care is central to my ministry, and central to being in full possession of my soul. If I am not taking care of myself, I have little hope of taking care of others, and less hope of encouraging others to take care of themselves.

Ministry is about caring. It is about caring 24/7. And yet, sadly, those in ministry, charged with the care of others, historically have had difficulty taking care of themselves. The high incidences of burn-out, substance abuse, physical disability, and boundary violations among clergy in the past are symptomatic of this lack of self-care. Clergy often enough have shorted themselves and their families of the time and space needed for their own spiritual nourishment which, in turn, has had disastrous consequences.

This, in large part, is why so much emphasis is paid now to clergy self-care. If clergy are taking care of themselves, the reasoning goes, then they are better equipped to take care of their flocks. Our own diocese has instituted these disciplines of self care into its guidelines for the letters of call priests receive to parishes in Massachusetts. When the Wardens and I negotiated my letter of call to St. Mary's in 2004, we intentionally incorporated these guidelines into our agreement. In that letter, I was guided to take days off weekly, take a month off yearly, take two weeks of continuing education and retreat time, and to take additional days off following Christmas and Easter. My letter of agreement also specified that after five years, I was to take a three month sabbatical.

Sabbaticals, while a long time fixture in the academic world, are fairly new to the vocation of ordained ministry. They are seen as times of refreshment and reflection that recharge clergy spiritually to return to their ministries with renewed vigor and purpose. Our bishops take sabbaticals regularly, as do many of the parish clergy in our diocese. I was most fortunate in my 15 year ministry at St. John's, Westwood to take two sabbaticals. I can say, now, that these sabbaticals were great infusions of the Holy Spirit into me, my family, and the parish I served.

I see the sabbatical that we are about to experience together at St. Mary's as an opportunity for our mutual growth in self-understanding, in greater commitment, and in deeper devotion to God and our mission as a parish. I am taking this sabbatical now because I have great confidence in all of you. I have confidence that Kris is prepared to assume this

Planning ahead for vacations and holidays are undertaken routinely and with joyous anticipation. But how many of us do the same for the one inevitable journey we all must take?

The ECW is proud to announce our program for our **March 11, 2009** meeting cosponsored by the ECW and the Pastoral Care Parish Nurses of St. Mary's. Catherine Morrison has coordinated a fascinating panel of experts to tackle the very difficult subject of death and dying. The discussion, entitled **Planning for a Graceful Exit** will feature an attorney talking about Wills, Trusts, Life Estates, Health Care Proxies and Living Wills, a funeral home director regarding planning a funeral and writing an obituary, a representative of Hospice & Palliative Care of Cape Cod, a member of our clergy regarding spiritual guidance and options and funeral service planning. The panel will open up a discussion among attendees and answer questions.

We hope you will attend this program which we believe will help alleviate the uncertainties of all our inevitable exits and guide us through dealing with the final illnesses and death of loved ones with courage and serenity.

Miracle Kitchen

The Miracle Kitchen is one of Saint Mary's most direct and effective outreach programs. Our church provides more annual meals than any other volunteer group in the Salvation Army mid day meal program.

In 2009 we will provide 28 full course meals for 85-100 persons. Our meals consist of a casserole, salad, bread & butter, a beverage and dessert. The cost is less than \$1.00 per serving. We serve on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month plus the 5th Wednesday when it occurs in a given month.

In the course of the year we use approximately: 500 pounds of various meats, chicken and tuna fish, 200 pounds of pasta, 150 packaged cakes (about 2,500 pieces), untold quantities of canned string beans, whole kernel corn, tomatoes, peas, mixed vegetables or **shaped** pasta (no spaghetti or linguini).

Currently there are 30 individuals from Saint Mary's plus a former member donating their talent and time as cooks, bakers, servers and drivers. Do you want to **help**? Do you want to **donate**? Call Jack at 508 385 4789



Turkey Brigade

The Turkey Brigade which assisted families with a delicious bountiful turkey dinner was a huge success. Thanks to the outpouring of love and sharing from our community, especially St Mary's, 170 families were helped!

Here are the figures: 170 families provided dinner; 48 people from Saint Mary's participated; 52 dinners were provided for between St Mary's, Cape Cod Baseball League and Swing Dance Group; 16 additional turkeys provided by Stop & Shop and Shaw's and Saint Mary's donors; \$330 collected in donations of cash and gift cards. Thank you very much for your generosity and desire to help others, especially on short notice. I was truly overwhelmed by the turnout from Saint Mary's. ~Judy Scarafile

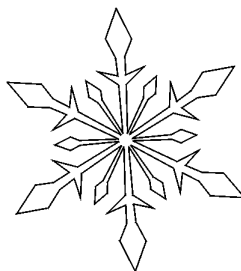

Yes we can each family recruit one new member to join our church – how awesome would that be if every family (almost 300 of you) decided to make this a personal goal for 2009.

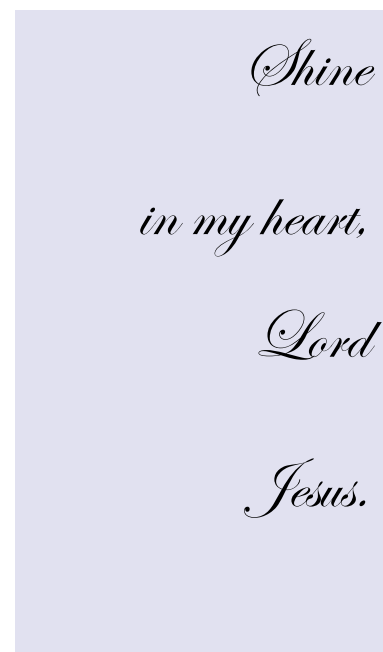
Yes we can remember to sign in on the sign-in sheet in the office after hours so we don't set off the alarm.

VESTRY NOTES

Vestry meetings in December and January focused largely on finances. While expenses are down for 2008, an overly optimistic estimate of pledge income and the decline in endowment income has led us to a deficit in 2008. In light of the current economic crisis, we, like many churches, face a similar situation for 2009. The vestry is committed to reversing this trend in 2010 and beyond.

The vestry is grateful to Phyllis Bradley for chairing the Memorial Gifts and Blessings Fund Committee. Other business included sabbatical planning, and the initiation of a visioning committee to consider long term staffing goals for ministry to young families.

LITURGICALLY SPEAKING

Lent Is On the Way



Mark your calendars now, as we prepare for the season of Lent which comes at the close of February. On Sunday, February 22, following the 10:00 am service, the Rev. Mark Anschutz will lead an adult forum on the history and practices of Lent. On Tuesday, February 24 at 6:00 pm we will celebrate Shrove Tuesday with a potluck featuring delectable dishes and decadent desserts, followed by the burning of the palms and putting away the alleluias. On Ash Wednesday, February 25 we will celebrate Holy Eucharist with the imposition of ashes four times: 7:30 am, 10:00 am, 7:30 pm and a special children's liturgy at 5:00 pm.
